We also heard from **Meghan Cornelius** (Graduate 2003) who has made a career with the Department of Agriculture and Food and is in the last stages of receiving her doctorate in sheep-worm resistance. **Chris Giles** (Graduate 2006) spoke on his career that saw him go onto university and study Marine Biology and gaining employment with the Fisheries Department and how he made the decision to leave his career to go into the world of finance with Bendigo Bank.

It was encouraging to hear these two ex-students and how this College had aided them in being able to have the confidence to take on challenges and problem solve their way through to both being highly successful leaders in our community.

Extra Workshop Sessions

The Automotive, Engineering and Furnishing workshops are open twice a week after school. Several students have taken advantage of the extra time to complete exercises enabling them to start work sooner on their major projects. This has obvious advantages for students who utilise this time.

There are also some students who need to attend to gain extra assistance to ensure they meet the requirements for their courses.

Furnishing & Engineering Accounts

As student's commence their major projects, the College is happy to purchase all materials on your behalf. This has proved to be time saving in terms of reducing delays in material arriving and being able to rectify ordering errors quickly.

Our process for sending out project accounts is outlined below. We are trying to ensure parents don't get a surprise when accounts arrive.

Initially a "Commencement Account" and a "Project Confirmation Slip" will be sent home. Parents need to return the Project Confirmation Slip as quickly as possible so that students may start their projects. Then payment

of the Commencement Account (50% estimate of the approximate total cost) is required. On completion of the project, a detailed final account will be sent with the balance due before the project can be collected.

Twenty two students travelled to Wagin Woolorama to compete in the Young Judges Championships as well as the shearing and wool handling competitions. In the Judging competition, there were over sixty competitors from Colleges around the state and Cunderdin students had a fantastic day out winning top ten places in all areas.

In the Merino judging, the team of **Danny Halligan, Reece Fisher, Grace Davey and Phillip McDonald** placed 1st, and individually **Reece Fisher** placed 1st with **Aimee Tyson** 2nd.



In the Wool Judging, **Chloe King** placed 3rd and **Ben Liddelow** 5th.

Poll Dorset Judging, **Kaiden Johnston** 2nd and **Jayden Smith** 3rd.

Cattle Judging, **Mac Kempton** 2nd, **Megan Stevens** 5th and **Acacia Shannon** 11th.



In the Novice Shearing, **Shannon McLean** placed 2nd, **Kaiden Johnston** 5th, **Cody Eva** 6th,

Hayden Wiltshire 8th, **Ben Liddelow** 15th and **Bailey McDonnell** 16th.

In the Novice Wool Handling **Jayden Smith** placed 2nd and in the under 21 Shearing, he placed 6th.

Not to be out done by his students **Mr Laird** entered the open Wool Handling competition and placed 1st. **Mr Laird** also entered the College Poll Dorset sheep in "1 Ram 2 Ewes Group" and placed 2nd, with a "Progeny Group" also placed 2nd.

Congratulations to all the students for their efforts both on the day and the training they did in their own time

leading up to Woolorama. A special mention to **Mr Laird** and **Mr Byrnes** for the coaching of students prior to the competition.



While on the topic of student success, **Mr Byrnes** took a team of eight students to Albany to compete in the "Gate to Plate" competition.

On the 15th to 17th of March Cunderdin Ag once again attended the Albany Ag Society's Interschool Beef Industry Challenge. The event is held at Willyung Farms feedlot in Albany. Through the course of the event, students were treated to information sessions from beef industry leaders and experts many of whom have been through the Ag College system themselves. After all of the information sessions had concluded, students were selected at random to be quizzed on what they had learned. Teams consist of eight students and this year we took; **Todd Williams, Mac Kempton, Inaya Stone, Nicola Pronk, Brodie Metcalfe, Rohan Obst, Bill Schorer and Lawson Butler.**

Todd was tested on Low Stress Stockhandling techniques. **Nicola** was tested on meat cuts and what you need to know about beef and came first. **Lawson** was tested on marketing beef and came third. **Bill** was tested on understanding beef structure and came third. **Rohan** was tested on NLIS, livestock identification and traceability and **Mac, Brodie and Inaya** were tested on all subjects. They placed first, second and third respectively.



Farm Report continued

This fantastic effort by all of our students saw us come second to Denmark Ag by only 20 points and I'm informed, saw us finish well in front of all other schools. The other schools in attendance were Harvey Ag, Narrogin Ag, Mt Barker Senior High and Great Southern Grammar, which means that the competition was stiff with some of these schools having much larger cattle enterprises than the one at Cunderdin.

The students should be commended on a fantastic effort and we will look forward to going to the event next year in the hopes of getting our name on that illustrious shield.

Elsewhere on the farm, development has continued with the new insulated roof on the Piggery finisher shed completed and back in use. The Farrowing shed upgrade is all but finished with new side wall shutters fitted and two new evaporative air conditioners installed, with the only hold up being the arrival of the correct control box. Well done to **Miss Davey** for managing the piggery while these improvements were being installed as it has caused significant disruption to operations.

The Cropping section has started sowing some oats for feed for livestock and with the 76mm of rainfall received over Easter the oats should jump out of the ground and provide some early feed for cattle and sheep. The boom

spray will be busy next week keeping germinating weeds under control and preserving moisture in paddocks marked down for the cropping program this year.

The Butcher shop has been a hive of activity with the installation of a new smoke oven and processing animals to keep up with the demand of the kitchen to feed all the students. **Mr Frantom** has had a steady stream of students passing through the butcher shop learning the skills of butchering and the class teachers have also taken advantage of his knowledge bringing students down to see carcasses on the hook. This gives real meaning to fat scoring.

In the farm workshop **Mr Ball** has had students building a new round bale feed out trailer that will allow the unrolling of round bales



without the need of hydraulics or a tractor. This means that it can be towed with our normal dual cab utes and still be unrolled in the paddock. This is very nearly finished and the next decision is what colour to paint it.

Reach Boarding

Apologies to parents affected by the recent melt down of Reach Boarding which saw parents receiving multiple text messages and emails all displaying the same message. This problem originated with the provider and not the College. The problem has now been fixed and should not occur again.

One of the features of the program is that if leave arrangements change at any time, parents have two options. If leave has been approved, just submit a new leave application. If leave has not been approved by the College, you can login and update the current leave application. There is no need to ring Residential staff to try and update as they are not able to approve changes to leave.

Students are encouraged to submit leave applications so that parents only have to approve the leave application. If early leave is being requested and no information is provided as to why early leave is requested, the leave application will be rejected, so please provide the information in the leave application.

When leave indicates a return time before 5.30pm, Reach Boarding automatically requests an evening meal for your child. Imagine the frustration for kitchen staff when that person does not arrive until a later time and the meal is not required - a bit the same as you expecting 20 people for dinner and only 10 actually roll up.

Please also be aware that Residential staff will contact parents if their child has not signed in within 30 minutes of their indicated return time.

After School Activities

There have been a number of sporting activities being run after school in response to students indicating there was nothing to do after school. Some of these include Cricket and Tennis practice with Mr Beatty and Furball with myself. These are in addition to Football and Hockey training which are held in town. Netball training will commence shortly.

BStreet Smart - Ms Kristy Hackford

On the 16th March the year 12s attended a seminar run by the RAC on driver safety called BStreet Smart. BStreet Smart is a seminar focusing on young drivers and some of the issues they may come across while driving. There is a simulated car accident, in which the public, police, ambulance and fire and rescue attend. They show us what happens when a serious car accident happens on the roads. They use the jaws of life to show us what happens when people can't get out of vehicles after an accident. The end of the event is where everyday people come and share their experiences and how their lives have been impacted by road trauma. This year there was a man from the RAC Helicopter service explaining what it is he does and how they fill their days. It was interesting to find out that they have three levels of assistant and obviously the most important is attending serious crash or injury victims. He told us about attending an accident on the highway in the Wheatbelt for a young girl who was hit by a drunk driver. The girl survived but it was because she fought to stay alive on the roadside and initially he thought he was already too late. He told us that if we ever meet, it will probably be the worst day of our life.



The next speaker was a woman; she told us how she lost her daughter, Bron, in a motorcycle accident just a year before. She reminded us how just one moment of indecision can change not only yours, but your whole families lives forever. She told us how if Bron had thought about the fact that the rider of the motorcycle had been drinking, she may never have gotten on that bike. She told us that if her daughter had thought for one moment that she would not come home that night; she never would have gotten on that bike. We all took something away from the stories the speakers shared and I think it would have been hard not to feel for the people who have experienced such traumatic events throughout their lives. We all left with a new appreciation for family and friends.

And of course no excursion to Perth is complete without a Maccas run.
