
## **National Merino Challenge**

#### **Dormitories**

Unfortunately our trial of allowing students access to other dormitories has come to an end due to the inappropriate behaviour of a handful of students. It is disappointing to see that these students have disadvantaged the majority of students by their actions.

This will be reviewed but is dependant on appropriate student behaviour.

### **Garden Beds**


#### **Automotives**

### Farm—Mr Kim Gray



We have certainly had a magnificent start to the growing season in 2016. Some long serving staff members believe it is probably the best start they can remember.

As at 20 May, we have received 207mm for the year compared with 70mm this time last year. Consequently pastures have bolted away with good clover and serradella germinations in among the rye grass self-sown cereals and capeweed. Some pasture manipulation has already been carried out.

### Sheep

The sheep section has been capably managed by *Mrs Iles* while *Mr Laird* has been on leave in the United Kingdom recently and on his return, he has been surprised at the huge volume of feed available for his sheep.

Ewes have been lambing on to green pasture and have been able to produce large quantities of milk for their lambs so both lambs and mothers are looking in fantastic condition.

On 13 May, Mr Laird took a team of five students to Sydney to compete in the National Merino Challenge after they had been successful in winning the Merino Junior Judging competition at the Wagin Woolorama. The team consisted of Grace Davey, Reece Fisher, Danny Halligan, Phillip McDonald and Aimee Tyson.

"The NMC was held over the weekend in Sydney with 140 students from across Australia. Western Australia was well represented with teams from the Cunderdin, Harvey and Narrogin

Colleges of Agriculture as well as students from Murdoch University's Animal Science course.

An initiative of AWI, the Challenge aims to offer basic skills surrounding sheep management and appraisal using both traditional and modern methods and also introduce students to the career opportunities within the sheep and wool industries.

Congratulations to Kristy Walter, Murdoch, for coming 2nd in the Production Class and 1st overall in the Tertiary division and to Lauren Rayner from Narrogin College of Agriculture for also coming 2nd in the Production class and 2nd overall in the Secondary school division.

Kristy was invited by the Stud Merino Breeders Association WA (SMBAWA) to be an Associate Judge in the Merino section at last year's Perth Royal Show after her outstanding performance at the Agvivo sheep handling workshop.

Cunderdin won the Junior Judging at the 2016 Woolorama and then became entitled to the SMBAWA prize of \$1500 to assist with sending a team over to the Challenge.

Bayer came on board to sponsor the vests that all of the WA College of Agriculture students wore during the challenge. As well as the Bayer logo, the vests also carried the SMBAWA and the colleges were also able to incorporate their logo.

The students who took part will take away some great experiences and knowledge from the event and well done to all of the people involved at the

colleges and Murdoch University, the parents and students who made it happen. As you can see from the photos

#### **Cattle**

**Mr Byrnes** with his cattle section is equally excited with the huge amount of paddock feed out there so early in the season.

He has had students busily erecting electric wires around paddocks to take advantage of the high level of pasture growth in paddocks he hasn't had cattle in before, as well as replacing old fences.

The other project on the go is setting up the small feedlot trial for next term which involves Cert III students planning the fencing requirements and the installation of those new fences. This feedlot trial will be 20 head of cattle and involve intensive feeding and measurement of growth rates involving students

from class Animal Production studies. We are looking forward to the results and benefits to students in being able to track animals right through the production process to scoring the carcasses in the butcher shop.

### **Piggery**

Ms Maddi Davey in the Piggery has finally got all her sheds back in one piece after some lengthy material delivery delays which held up the completion of farrowing and finisher shed upgrades. This will certainly alleviate some of the management difficulties she has had to deal with in recent months.

The farrowing shed is full at present, which is the object of the exercise to keep production levels up and numbers heading off to market. Our goal is to reach 100 pigs at 100kgs live weight per month to market.

We are continuing to cull our older sows to make way for Myora blood line sows and will eventually have 70 Myora sows. In conjunction with **Ms Leanne Sjollema** from Animal Production in the class area. **Ms Maddi** has

commenced a trial with weaner pigs using two different rations to explore ways to reduce any weight loss of piglets at weaning.

**Ms Maddi** will be travelling to the Gold Coast to

attend the Pan Pacific Pork Expo and also the APIAM Animal Health Conference. *Ms Maddi* is one of eight people around Australia nominated by Animal Health Professionals in the "Young Guns Award" to be presented on the Tuesday night. We wish her all the best and either way it is certainly a great honour to be nominated for this award.

### **Butcher shop**

Mr Frantom has been busy supplying a steady stream of meat products to the kitchen to keep the students well fed as well as giving students some valuable tuition in the meat processing trade. The new smoke oven has been installed and operating well, we are now in the process of upgrading the cryovac machine and hopefully that will arrive next week.

The Butcher shop is due for audit next week so *Mr Frantom* has been making sure all paperwork is in order and we are compliant to all regulations and I must say he has the butcher shop and surrounding area looking very neat and tidy and in excellent condition.

### Farm Workshop

Mr Ball has had a wide range of problems to solve during the seeding program, the most troublesome was the broken axle on the combine. It is a long story but suffice to say that after the initial contact between combine wheel and strainer post, the third attempt at repair with a high tensile axle has been successful and all is good. I will add the issue with the axle was not of Mr Ball's workmanship but with the quality of the steel in the axle supplied.

The new cricket bowling machine stand is rapidly taking shape as students are welding the frame together and now need to fit wheels.

A project is also under way relocating some sheep yards to the newly acquired farm land East of the College home farm.

### Cropping

The cropping program is almost complete with three paddocks of wheat and one paddock of peas still to sow. It has been a fantastic start to the growing season as mentioned and all crops have been germinating well with warm and moist soil promoting early crop vigour.

Our program consists of 170ha Canola, 355ha Wheat, 440ha Barley, 250ha Lupins, 63ha Oats, 90ha Triticale, 40ha Peas and 200ha Clover/Serradella.

Mr Childs and Mr Dumbrell have had students operating the seeding and spraying equipment throughout the program and are very close now to having all the Year 12 students that wanted to, drive the seeding machinery.

At this point I'm only aware of two small sections of fencing that will need some repair, a good result.

### Vocational Education and Training

Mr Longmire and Mrs Skinner have been assisting students with progressing with their Cert II/ Cert III competencies with most Year 12's close to finishing their Cert II, if they haven't already finished. There are some however, who still have a long way to go and really need to apply themselves in order to catch up. Parents are encouraged to ask their son/daughter on their progress and to encourage them to ensure they are on track to complete their work.

Mr Longmire has told me that the Cert III students still have a lot of work to complete and are encouraged to make use of him or other farm staff if they need assistance with any of their work.



### Plant Production Systems Sclerontina Trial—Mr Paul Jasper

This year, as part of their production section within Plant Production Systems class, the Year 12 ATAR students will be taking part in the Canola Rot Watch program. It is piloted by a small number of schools (4 - 6) that have specialist agriculture programs. Schools are asked to grow a small plot of canola, monitor the local weather conditions and for the presence of Sclerotinia stem rot, and if disease is present, collect sclerotia samples to send into the Centre for Crop Disease and Management (CCDM).

Sclerotinia stem rot (SRR), commonly known as white mould, is considered one of the most destructive fungal infections to canola crops and numerous other broad leaf plants. This disease is caused by a fungus called Sclerotinia sclerotiorum, that survive in soils for many years. The fungus germinates during cool, wet weather that provides moisture for the infection (prominent in South-Western Australia).



A severe infection can cause significant damage to canola crops, by lodging and girdling the stems, ultimately reducing crop quality and yield. Currently, it is estimated that SSR results in a loss of \$10 million per annum and is considered the second most important fungal disease of any break crop.



To help the students begin the experiment, the College was visited by the *Gina Pearse* and *Dr Matt Denton-Giles* from Curtin University on Tuesday the 10 May. Their purpose was to provide instructions whilst also delivering the experimental kit.

The pilot is essentially a trial to tease out any potential difficulties with the

project. It is hoped that in the future this program could then be rolled out more widely to regional WA schools. This would provide CCDM with a yearly supply of isolates and information about disease incidence to assist with forecasting disease outbreaks.
