Year 12 General Depth Trial - Mr Justin Fox

The Year 12 General students have just planted their seeding depth trial last week. This trial requires students to set up 50 randomized plots, each planted with 10 replications of Mace wheat seeds planted at 0.5cm, 1cm, 2cm, 5cm and 10cm deep.

Over the next few months we will monitor the growth and tillering of each plot to analyse how the depth of seeding can change the quality of the plant and it's final produce.

> Students will be collecting, recording comparing

they collect throughout the trial period. They produce report which they



will use to explain what they have done, what the data shows and create logical conclusions from this data.

EST

The Year 12 General Course students have sat their Externally Set Tasks. All students enrolled in a General Year 12 course and/or a Foundation Year 12 course are required to complete the Externally Set Task (EST) developed by the Authority for that course. The EST is compulsory and forms part of the school-based assessment and is included as a separate assessment type with a weighting of 15% for the pair of units.

OLNA

For those students that didn't prequalify or hadn't passed and therefore sat the OLNA test in March, the results have been released by the authority on Monday 14 May. I have met with all students individually that haven't passed and sent home a letter outlining the areas your student found difficult or conversely to congratulate those that have now passed their OLNA.

The WA College of Agriculture - Cunderdin will be able to use this information along with school-based assessments and observations when identifying areas requiring support and planning intervention strategies for individual students prior to the September round of assessments.

Semester One Examinations

Year 12 exams begin Monday the 28 May and continue until Wednesday the 30 May. Year 11 exams will be on the following Wednesday 6 until 8 June.

The exam period is a particularly stressful time for students however with good preparation and confidence with one's knowledge, all participants that sit their exams should feel as though they can achieve positive results. These exams are a great tool in preparing the students for their end of year WACE Exams and their future educational goals.

Semester One Reports

The teachers are all busy writing the Semester One reports. For the Year 12s this report is particularly important, as it is the last report received with a

comment on it. Reports are an important document that may be asked for at a job interview, when applying for an apprenticeship or admission to TAFE or University.



Important notice regarding exams and tests

Please note that exams and tests are set for particular days/weeks and we do not reschedule unless for medical reasons.

Important dates regarding testing and exams are given to the students well in advance and they are provided with an examination timetable at least two weeks before the exams.

Examination week dates are also published in the newsletter, on the term planner and on our website. The external WACE Examinations for Year 12 are set by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority and schools have no jurisdiction over these dates. The examination period for 2018 is *Monday, 29 October to Friday, 16 November.*

The first and second instalments of residential fees must be cleared by the end of Semester One for students to continue in residence in Semester Two. Please ensure that all payments have been made to the College by the due date or you have made prior arrangements with me for a payment plan to ensure that we do not have to terminate any of your children from boarding at this College.

Country Week


Design & Technology - Mr Stephen Prangnell



This period of the year is busy with most students commencing major projects. It's time for the Year 12s to start developing a sense of urgency with their work. Not enough students are utilising the workshop after hours to ensure they will be able to undertake some of the larger projects. It would be appreciated if parents could encourage their sons/daughters to make use of the extra time available to them. As mentioned previously an estimation of total costs will be given and materials can be purchased through the College.

Trade Tour

It was pleasing to see there was more interest than usual for the Trade Tour this year and we have to run two. One group has been on 22 May and the next will be on 5 June.



Year II students visit **Westrac** and **Hofmann Engineering**. On speaking to students who have attended the tour, they were very impressed with both sites. The scale of work at both sites is exciting and it is valuable for our students to be exposed to these types of industry. It has also impressed upon them the importance of their studies and the value of Work Experience in gaining employment once they finish at the College. Furnishing

Most Year I Is are nearing completion of their small cabinet and should now be planning major projects. General Construction

Students have had a busy time in General Construction and have been primarily working on their bricklaying skills. They have also been involved in work on the Piggery, building fences and laying concrete paths. Work is also commencing on the Cattle Yards with students involved in erecting the fences.

Engineering

Year 12 students are either completing exercises or commencing their major projects. I would strongly encourage those students yet to commence their projects to utilise the after hours



workshop sessions to complete their set tasks. Any parents wishing to discuss their child's progress or projects are welcome to contact staff.

Year II students are developing fusion welding skills through oxy-acetylene welding exercises, plus completing bench work and machining activities.

Automotives

Students are continuing to work through their competencies as well as working on some projects in Automotives.

Work is continuing on the old Landcruiser with a Ford 5 Litre V8 conversion. The brakes have been done and work is continuing on the body work. An enthusiastic



group of students have been working during after hours workshop sessions.

Also a Supercharged V6 Commodore motor has been kindly donated by **Perry Jasper**. This engine is being mounted on an engine stand and is currently being disassembled and prepared for a rebuild.

Prime Lamb Trial - Miss Leanne Sjollema



These past few months has seen the Year 12 ATAR students learning about digestion of feeds and manipulation of rations through their annual Prime Lamb Trial. The students monitored weight gain, fat depth and eye muscle depth on Merino wethers to determine the effects of their three chosen rations on productivity over an eight week period. **Mr Laird** and **Mrs lles** were instrumental to the success of this trial and wonderful about sharing their knowledge with this group of students.

As a follow up, we were fortunate enough to view several careases

from each of the feed groups and compare the quality of the final product, from weight and finish to overall yield from the carcase. This was a great hands on learning experience for the class as **Mr Jones** treated them to a lesson on meat eating quality and consumer preferences while he broke down the carcases. These practical activities are designed to support the

Farm - Mr Daniel De Beer



Term 2 started with blue skies and sunshine. The autumn is finishing with above average temperatures and well below average rainfall, which are not ideal conditions for pasture growth or seeding! But we soldiered on and have done half our Canola program, completed the Lupins and Oats programs and started on our Wheat and Barley. We will probably get most of the Wheat and Barley in the ground, but for now we pray for rain.

Among the gloom, we had students achieving their "Establishing a Crop" competencies with **Mr Childs** and the renovated John Shearer combine has finished seeding two pasture paddocks, giving more students the opportunity to achieve seeding competencies.

A group of high flying students went to Dog v Drone competition.

On Wednesday the 16 May, ten Year 12 students along with **Mr Dumbrell** and **Mr Longmire** attended the Drones v Dogs trials at **Muresk Institute**.

Prior to the actual trials event, students from the College had been given the opportunity to practise their drone flying skills on a large screened simulator, which **Muresk Institute** had driven around to various Colleges state wide. Following on from this **Layne Thornton** was the selected student to represent the College in the trials event at **Muresk Institute**.

On the day, **Layne** received professional drone pilot training and a crash course on how not to crash an expensive drone. He then competed against students from at least eight other schools by flying a drone around a specially marked out course. He flew very well but didn't come away with Ist prize, which was winning an actual drone for your respective school.

The other Cunderdin students who attended were able to cheer **Layne** on. They also listened to speakers who talked about the latest drone technology and career information. The speakers outlined opportunities within the agricultural sector, as well as tertiary education courses which **Muresk** were offering.

After this we were off to Adelaide!

This year the College entered 13 students in the National Merino Challenge held at the Adelaide Show grounds over the weekend of the 18 – 20 May. They were accompanied by **Mr Wayne Laird** Sheep Technical Officer and **Mrs Leanne Grant-Williams** Assistant Farm Manager.



The Challenge was held over two days and the students completed seven mini challenges. Students came from across Australia and competed in both tertiary and secondary sections. The Challenges included; ram selection, feed budgeting, wool typing and valuing, ewe profitability, condition scoring and conformation assessment. The primary focus this year was on profitability.

Students learnt valuable tools in stock assessment regarding wool cut and yield, which is very relevant to running a profitable merino enterprise. All the guest speakers were very motivated and spoke of their personal experiences relevant to the merino industry, technology and career pathways for students, both from tertiary and secondary backgrounds. In the final exercise one of our students was given a budget of \$30,000 to purchase a ram during the auction challenge. As he only spent \$7000 (a very careful bidding strategy) he was able to bid on a further 2 rams. This made the other more tentative students, with bidding orders to fill, stay on their toes. All in all the students have done themselves and the College proud. Thank you!



We are looking forward to Lamb marking, which will happen very shortly. Seeding will continue and hopefully, the next time we talk, the farm is transformed into a picture perfect shade of green.
