

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

The Western Australian College of Agriculture-Cunderdin (WACOAC) owes its existence in large measure to the efforts of the late Mr. Steve Lundy. He convinced the Government of the day that Cunderdin was an appropriate place to establish an Agricultural School, using the RAAF land and facilities already existing there.

On 9 February 1959 the Education Department opened the school with an enrolment of 20 students. The original area, of some 384 hectares, was increased when the "Warrigal" property of 358 hectares, situated close to the Cunderdin township, was purchased.

The dormitories, How House, Weller House, Linto House, Moyle & Morton are named after staff members who have made significant contributions to the development of the College. In 2011 Moyle & Morton Dormitories were opened giving an additional 36 beds, with all dormitories air conditioned by 2012.

Following the Report of the Advisory Committee on Agricultural Education (McDowell Committee) the College became separate from the Town School and was renamed Cunderdin Agricultural College in 1984.

In 1996, the College purchased a further 445 hectares (known as Baxter's land) which adjoins our property on two sides. This land was previously leased to the College from 1990 - 1996. This purchase brought the total land available to the College to 1,585ha. In 2000 the College purchased a further 529ha from Fiegert's.

In 2016 the College was successful in securing an additional 1100ha of arable land that included the Greyhome and Jenzen blocks. The College now has a total of 4023ha of which 2516ha is arable. \$1.7 million in funding was sourced from Royalties for Regions with the Department of Education supporting the remaining funding required. A Trades Centre designed by College staff specifically to cater for the workshop needs of students was completed in February 1996. Also completed in February 1996, was the extensive Student Recreation Centre, which replaced a dilapidated building that existed from pre-war days.

In September 1999 the College was independently validated to achieve Registered Training Organisation (RTO) status. This qualification allowed the College to deliver and assess national competency-based Training Packages.

WACoA, Cunderdin is part of the five residential Agricultural Colleges consortium badged together under the one banner in 2000. Additionally, WACoA, Cunderdin is part of the Wheatbelt Education Region. The current model allows the College to retain 60% of the farm income generated for onsite operations with the remaining 40% forwarded to Central Office. Funding returned to Central Office can be used for both farm equipment purchases by the Agricultural Colleges and distributions to other schools within the state that run an agricultural programme.

In 2019 the College was one of only five secondary institutions to receive funding to enable it to expose students to new and emerging technologies which will greatly enhance their learning program in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) subjects. The College's profile as a leader in STEM programs is reflected in the Internet of Things technology on farm and being selected as a STEM Pioneer School.

The College continues to go from strength-to-strength with the continual acquisition of modern vehicles, machinery, and infrastructure to provide the latest educational outcomes. The Trade Training Centre additions were completed in 2014 seeing an extension to the existing Trades building. It also included a new Farm Workshop, offices and a new weaner grower shed in the piggery. More recent infrastructure improvements include 5 piggery dome shelters, a piggery office, finisher shed and construction of cattle yards.

The College has won numerous major awards including the State and National winner of the Vocational Education and Training Excellence Awards. The College has also been a winner and finalist in the WA Secondary School of the Year Awards. In 2018, 2019 and 2020 our College topped the state with 100 per cent of the Year 12 students achieving a WACE. In 2021, Year 12 graduate, Charlotte Crossen was announced as the Beazley Medal recipient for VET.

The College was also nominated as a finalist for the DTWD WA Training Awards in the 'Small RTO of the Year' category in 2022, winning in 2023 and being the Bronze medallist in the Australian Training Awards. In addition, the college has been recognised as a finalist for the WA Education Awards for the 'Excellence in Teaching and Learning - Secondary' in both 2023 and 2024.
